

The 10-Year Home Readiness Checklist

A calm, room-by-room guide for identifying what works today, what deserves attention, and what can wait.

USE THIS CHECKLIST THREE WAYS

Walk through the home slowly. Mark anything that creates friction today. Then sort each item into Now, Soon, or Later - without assuming every observation requires a project.

Before you begin

Think about the people who use the home today, guests who visit regularly, and changes that could affect daily routines over the next decade. Temporary injuries and recovery periods are useful tests of how adaptable a home may be.

Current friction, safety concerns, or easy improvements.	Items to coordinate with maintenance or planned renovations.	Options to preserve and revisit before they become urgent.

Arrival and entry

Consider the route from the car or sidewalk through the door - not only the doorway itself.

☐ A commonly used entrance can be reached without steep or unstable steps.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐
☐ Walkways are even, well lit, and wide enough for comfortable passage.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐

Circulation and stairs

Look at the paths used every day, including turns, transitions, and places where furniture narrows movement.

☐ Halls and frequently used routes remain clear and comfortable.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐
☐ Flooring transitions are secure and easy to see.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐
☐ Stairs have consistent lighting and stable handholds.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐

Lighting and visibility

Good lighting supports comfort, balance, and confidence throughout the home.

☐ Entries, stairs, halls, bathrooms, and work surfaces are evenly lit.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐
☐ Switches are conveniently located at room entries and both ends of stairs.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐
☐ Glare and deep shadows are minimized.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐

Bathrooms

Bathrooms often deserve early planning because small dimensions and fixed plumbing can limit future options.

☐ The primary bathroom is comfortable to enter, turn within, and use.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐
☐ The shower or tub can be entered without a difficult step or unstable motion.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐
☐ There are secure handholds where balance may be needed.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐

☐ Lighting is bright without harsh glare.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐

Kitchen and everyday storage

Focus on frequently repeated tasks rather than redesigning around every possible limitation.

☐ Everyday dishes, food, and appliances are easy to reach.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐
☐ There is a comfortable work surface that can be used while seated if desired.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐
☐ Traffic routes do not conflict with open appliance doors.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐
☐ Lighting clearly covers counters, cooking areas, and sinks.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐
☐ Controls and handles are easy to see and operate.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐

Bedroom and first-floor living

A flexible home has a realistic way to support essential daily living on one level.

☐ A suitable sleeping space is available - or could be created - on the main level.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐
☐ The route between bedroom and bathroom is short, clear, and well lit.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐

Technology, communication, and security

Simple systems can support independence when they are reliable and easy to use.

☐ Smoke and carbon-monoxide alarms are current and easy to monitor.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐
☐ The home has dependable cellular or internet coverage where needed.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐
☐ Door, lighting, temperature, and security controls are understandable.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐

Maintenance and outside areas

A home that is physically usable may still become burdensome if upkeep is difficult to manage.

☐ Utilities, filters, panels, and shutoffs are accessible and clearly labeled.	NOW ☐ SOON ☐ LATER ☐

Turn observations into a practical roadmap

1. Start with current friction

Address items that already make the home uncomfortable, difficult to use, or harder to maintain.

2. Coordinate with planned work

If a bathroom, kitchen, entry, floor, or major system is already being updated, consider long-term usability before work begins.

3. Preserve future options

Identify structural or layout constraints early enough that you can compare renovation, adaptation, and relocation choices calmly.

4. Involve the right professionals

Contractors and appropriately licensed professionals should evaluate feasibility, dimensions, code requirements, permits, pricing, and construction.

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
